2020 CVEF GRANTS

- Levi E. Coe Library, Indoor Family Fun: Popular board games such as giant checkers, giant jenga and rubber horseshoes are available for check out.
- Janice Baker, Creative Community For Women: Expressive art. Workshops relieve stress, foster self-expression and build connection.
- Durham Public Library, Building Community Through Virtual Reality: This new gaming system allows participants to connect and experience new places through video games and armchair traveling, individually or through large group participation.
- Claudia and Gage Rovelli, Math Tutoring For 7th Grade Students: This repeat of last summer's program is a 6-week math tutoring program. The tutoring is offered free of charge by an all-volunteer team of CRHS students.
- Susan Michael, Renewing Native Ecosystems: Local ecosystems are victim to invasive plant, insect and worms. This project includes education, removal and replanting. Residents learn how to identify invasive species and native replacements. Brewster School's Wolf Tree Trail and Field Ecosystems is being remediated.

- Durham/Middlefield Youth and Family Services, Early Childhood Council (ECC): The ECC promotes, supports and provides community-wide efforts and resources for children ages birth-8 in Durham and Middlefield.
- Jen Huddleston, The Giving Garden Honeybee Hives: The addition of honeybee hives offers an opportunity to practice beekeeping. Participants can better understand the importance of pollinators and perhaps choose to have their own honeybees.



- Thomas Kannam and Heather McCutchen, Distance Theatre: Helping young adults find ways to create theatre throughout social distancing. Working as a summer program, performances presented online.
- William and Christine Foster, Washington Trail Revitalization



Project: This Eagle Scout Project has revitalized the George Washington Trail in Durham and Wallingford. It educates residents about Washington's travels through town. Trail markers are restored and an educational website created.

- Strong School & Everyone Outside, Memorial School Guided Recess: This project offers 3rd-5th graders the use of the natural surroundings of Memorial School for exploration and play through guided recess. Mentors, with teacher consultation, help students appropriately interact on the fields and in the woods.
- Kalmia Garden Chamber Music, Educational Outreach: Kalmia Garden Chamber Music and Arts Foundation plans to create an outreach program at Strong School and CRHS. A chamber music concert will be followed by students having their own performances, coached by the same professional musicians.


When asked what advice she would offer to encourage others to get involved and donate, she responded that folks merely need to "experience the richness of the ways CVEF is involved in the community."
